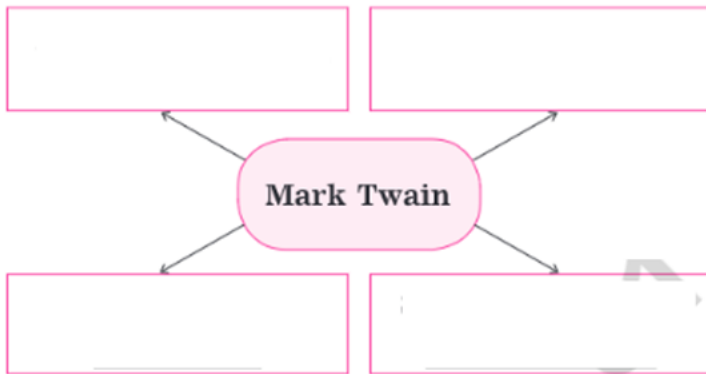

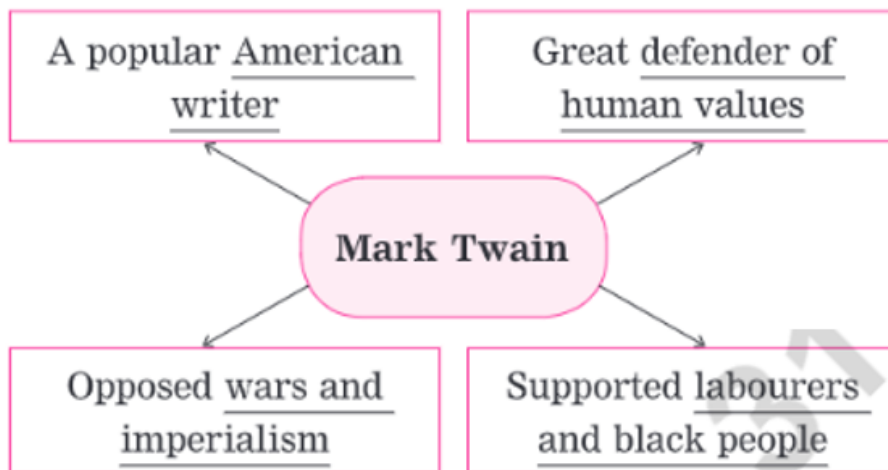

The decision was taken at the 43rd session of the UNESCO World Heritage Committee (WHC) in the historic city of Baku, Azerbaijan from June 30-July 2010. The fortified city of Jaipur, in India's northwestern state of Rajasthan was founded in 1727 by Sawai jai Singh II. The walled city of Jaipur, known for its iconic architectural legacy and vibrant culture, made its entry into the UNESCO World Heritage site list, becoming the second city in the country after Ahmedabad. India had proposed the notification of Jaipur as an exceptional urban example in indigenous city planning, the Ministry of Culture said in a statement.

"Besides exemplary planning its iconic monuments such as the Govind Dev Temple, City Palace, Jantar Mantar, and Hawa Mahal excel in artistic and architectural craftsmanship of the period."

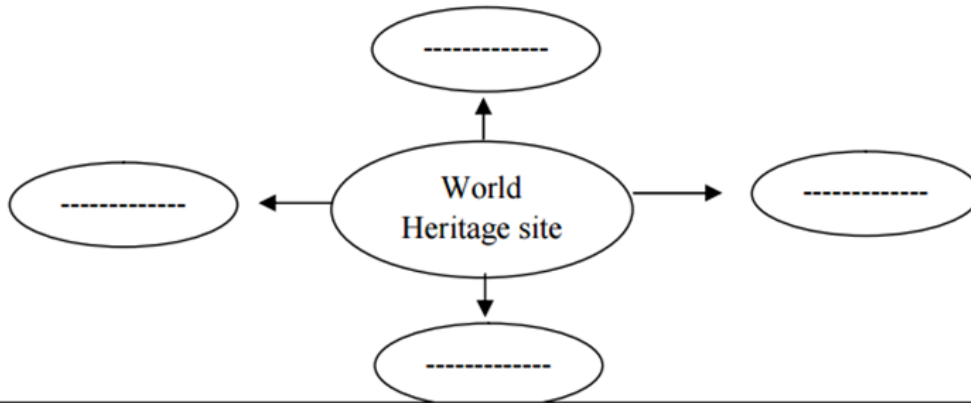

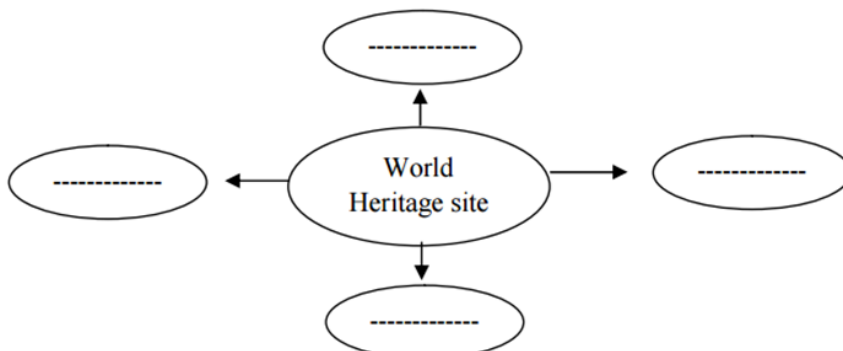

The United States is third with about 312 million users, but almost everyone there uses the Internet - 96.26%. Indonesia is fourth with about 212 million users, which is 73.70% of its population.
